
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PEACE THROUGH PLANNING:

GATHERING OF GENERAL DATA

Death comes to each of us. Often we have very little forewarning or control over the circumstances of our dying. Sudden death or death following a terminal illness remains part of the mystery of life. Planning for these end times is a gentle way of being supportive of our loved ones who, while grieving our dying, must also try to make a peaceful, orderly, and spiritual transition to living without us. This Guide is designed to make the planning for end times a logical step in the life of a responsible and caring adult.

Valuable Documents and Their Location

Because we live with a margin of the unknown, we take prudent steps to plan for what we cannot control. First among these steps is the preparation and organization of your medical, financial, and personal documents. The following list should be completed and kept together in a folder or binder, in a safe but readily accessible location for those who will need it:

- ⇒ *Peace Through Planning, Funeral Planning* after filling in the appropriate sections of this Guide, it may be given to the funeral home that has your pre-planned funeral, with your church, in the binder or folder that contains other important documents.
- ⇒ Health Care Directive a written statement that enables you to inform others of the kinds of health care you would or would not want. After you have prepared a Health Care Directive, copies should be on file with: your doctor, health care provider, hospital, designated health care agent and close family members.
- ⇒ *Power of Attorney* a legal document in which you give another person the authority to make decisions regarding your financial, business, and legal affairs.
- ⇒ *Personal Will* a Will tells everyone how to divide the property and other holdings you have accumulated over your lifetime.
- ⇒ *Insurance Company Information* (name, address, phone number) and insurance policies.
- ⇒ *Banking information* (name, address, phone number) and all account numbers.
- \Rightarrow All Financial Records.
- \Rightarrow Credit Card information, Military Discharge Forms, and other important documents.

\Rightarrow COPY OF YOUR OBITUARY.

The location of these documents should be given to your Power of Attorney or a close family member. *Immediate access to these documents in a safe deposit box may be legally restricted and therefore may not be readily available for health care or funeral planning and expenses.*

FUNERAL ARRANGEMENTS

The following paragraph is intended to free the survivors from undue constraint in planning the funeral of the undersigned.

I have given the following instructions as an aid to my family and friends in the event of my death. I understand that some of these instructions may not be able to be carried out. Ultimately, my funeral should be an experience that helps my family and friends deal with the reality of my death. I understand and expect that the instructions I have given here may need to be changed because of the circumstances and/or the needs of my family and friends. These instructions are intended to be a guide not an obstacle to a meaningful funeral.

The time of your death may be very stressful for those who must be attentive to the details surrounding the funeral, the liturgy, and burial. Loved ones may be expected to notify family and friends, select a casket and a cemetery plot, and plan for the visitation. Family and friends may also be invited to help plan the funeral liturgy, along with the pastoral staff of the church where the funeral will be held, so that the community can be led in prayer and worship services that reflect the life of and honor the memory of the deceased. Planning the funeral liturgy is an important part of the final farewell.

The Funeral Home will -

- \rightarrow Be your first contact after a death. If the death is at home you need to contact the police (call 911), or your hospice nurse.
- \rightarrow Assist with choosing a date and time for funeral.
- → Contact the church to notify the clergy, set the date and time.
- → Originate the Death Certificate and file with necessary government agencies.
- → Assist family in writing the obituary; and send it to all newspapers requested by family.
- \rightarrow Assist in choosing a casket or urn.
- \rightarrow Order food for the funeral reception, if so desired.
- \rightarrow Assist with ordering flowers.
- \rightarrow Distribute honorariums.
- → Provide information on and contact cemetery of choice.
- \rightarrow Arrange Visitation/Wake and/or Prayer Service.
- \rightarrow Set up at the church.

The Church will -

- → Arrange for a priest or pastoral care minister to come to the home of the deceased person's family immediately after the death for prayer and counseling. The *Sacrament*
 - *of the sick with Viaticum* (previously referred to as 'Last Rights') needs to be administered before death.
- \rightarrow Work with the Funeral Home on setting date and time.
- → Meet with family to go over liturgical information, including music, provided in this booklet for the Mass.
- \rightarrow Provide a worship aid (order of service) for the funeral.
- → Allow a Visitation/Wake to be held at the church the evening before and/or 1 hour before funeral, providing facility not previously reserved.
- → Offer St. John's Funeral Hospitality Ministry to assist with a reception/luncheon following the funeral, in Matthews Hall. They will: set up and decorate tables,
 - serve food provided by caterer, provide beverages (coffee, lemonade, water) and dessert (various cakes),

wash dishes and clean up.

The above listed services may change. Confirm with Parish Office at time of need.

For persons who have time to anticipate life's end time, this section of the booklet will provide guidance as you record information that will assist family and friends during funeral planning. You may complete this booklet by yourself, with family and friends, or with the help of the parish pastoral staff. The parish staff wants to make the planning of this farewell prayer a meaningful experience for those who gather to pray and remember.

Planning Suggestions

- Include all concerned persons in the funeral/liturgy planning.
- Use this information as a guide in selecting prayers, songs, and Scripture readings.
- Use a Bible or parish songbook when planning the liturgy.
- Speak with the parish staff about planning for a funeral luncheon served after the liturgy.
- Speak to the Funeral Director or the parish secretary about fees charged at the church.

Funeral Home

Arrangements with a funeral home of choice, if not made before death, should begin by the family soon after death. The complete services of the funeral home will then be available to the family. The funeral home of choice should be named here:

Burial or Cremation as Final Disposition

Burial symbolizes the return of the body to the basic earthly elements from which it was made and from which it will be called to resurrection. The cemetery plot provides a location for the survivors to honor the deceased. While many people prefer burial of the remains as they remember the deceased, others have expressed a desire to be cremated. Cremation has been permissible in the Catholic Church since 1963. It is preferable that the body be present for the funeral Mass with cremation to follow. After cremation, a private service of burial is arranged with the family. The cremains are placed in consecrated ground or a proper place of respect such as a mausoleum.

OVERVIEW OF THE FUNERAL RITE

The death and resurrection of Jesus gives new meaning to the death of a Christian. For us, life is changed, not ended. We believe that in prayer we have a powerful way of being with our loved ones who have passed from death to life.

The funeral rite consists of **the prayer vigil or wake, the funeral Mass, and the burial.** During the funeral rite, the family and friends of the deceased share with the greater community their sense of loss. In turn, the community provides hope and comfort through the shared prayers of the funeral liturgy.

THE PRAYER VIGIL OR WAKE

The wake service can be held either at the funeral home or in the church. Because friends and relatives come with memories to share and stories to tell, the wake service has a personal dimension.

The Rosary or a brief prayer service is part of the wake service. A tribute may be part of the wake service. During this less structured aspect of the wake service, family and friends are invited to share personal memories about the deceased. The individual tributes speak of the impact that the dead person had on the lives of others and the community. In addition to or instead of tributes, the wake service may include a favorite poem or songs or hymns that are not quite appropriate for the Eucharistic liturgy.

The wake service is prepared by the family with help as requested from the parish staff.

Memory Table

A memory table is another way of remembering the deceased. The memory table may contain photographs, mementos of special occasions, items symbolic of one's work or hobbies, insignia of office or organizational membership, or other items which are representative of the life of the deceased.



The Easter Candle is placed near the coffin at the church, as a reminder of the promise of Jesus to raise us up on the last day.

Selections for the readings and ritual actions to be used in the Funeral or Memorial Mass

THE FUNERAL MASS

Presiding Priest: Concelebrant:

Bringing the casket/urn to the church and moving the casket/urn to the sanctuary symbolizes the journey of the deceased from life into life eternal. Songs for this sacred event should be appropriate to a funeral liturgy.

Introductory Rites

The presider meets the casket/urn and mourners near the church entry. After greeting the mourners, the priest sprinkles the casket/urn with holy water in remembrance of the deceased's Baptism. A white cloth (pall) is placed on the casket/urn by family members or friends in remembrance of the white garment received at Baptism. The presider then turns and leads the procession to the front of the church. This action is accompanied by the Gathering song.

Opening Prayer

Liturgy of the Word

The Liturgy of the Word consists of a reading from the Old Testament, a psalm (sung), a reading from the New Testament, and a Gospel reading. The Gospel reading is the central idea of the Funeral Mass, those planning a funeral service should select the Gospel passage first. The priest who delivers the homily will look for guidance in planning the homily to the Gospel passage you have selected. The first two readings and the general intercessions may be read by a person or persons of your choice. See pages 12-13 for suggested readings.



Casketbearers:

There are usually six casketbearers (male or female) who assist in moving the casket at the church and cemetery. Usually, family members or friends of the deceased are asked to serve as casket bearers. Sometimes, honorary casket bearers are named. These people do not assist in carrying the casket but are named because of a special friendship or relationship with the deceased. Any number of individuals may serve as honorary casket bearers.



RITE OF COMMITTAL AT THE GRAVESIDE

The third and final part of the Funeral Rite, the Rite of Committal at the Graveside, may be more private and often the most painful aspect of the Funeral Rite. Only the closest people will journey this last distance with you. Sometimes the committal at the graveside takes place immediately after the funeral liturgy. Others choose to have the graveside service after they have shared a meal with family and friends. Persons who choose cremation may have a private burial at a later date.

A committal at a National Cemetery may include an Honor Guard and brief military ceremony. The funeral director will be able to provide you with information as to what is usual and customary under the circumstances.

For those who have experienced the loss of a loved one, the celebration of that life may bring some closure; but for those who remain, **LIFE IS ALSO FOREVER CHANGED**.

<u>"Remarks of Remembrance"</u> for Funeral Mass (Eulogy)

If a Eulogy at the conclusion of the Vigil Service is not possible, pastors may permit a family member or friend to speak "in memory of the deceased" after communion. These remarks should be carefully prepared and last no longer than 5-7 minutes total. The remarks must not in any way distort Catholic theology regarding death and life after death, contain elements which are not appropriate for the sacred atmosphere of the church, or be offensive to the family or assembly. The individual tribute speaks of the impact that the deceased person had on the lives of others and the community and may include a few special memories held by the speaker. This is not the time to read or paraphrase the obituary which is already available to those who attend the funeral mass.

In addition to or instead of a tribute, the family may choose to include a favorite poem, song, or hymn that is appropriate for the Eucharistic liturgy.

Guidelines for selecting Music and Musicians for Funeral Mass

<u>Music</u>: Each of the hymns or songs sung at a funeral mass has an important function. They serve to "support, console, and uplift the participants and should help to create in them a spirit of hope in Christ's victory over death." (<u>Order of Christian Funerals</u>, General Introduction, #31) Hymns and songs chosen for the funeral mass must be liturgical in nature and be appropriate for the particular celebration.

Songs that are not liturgical in nature or songs that are purely popular culture or national and have no Christian significance are not appropriate for the funeral mass.

At the conclusion of the funeral mass, the procession to the Place of Committal begins, and the Funeral Rite prescribes that a suitable verse from scripture or an appropriate liturgical song be sung. This would not be an appropriate time for non-religious music to be played or sung, unless approved in advance.

The Funeral Rites do not envision music being played which is not performed live, such as CD's or i-pods, since the use of music is a prayer and indeed a consolation to the faithful which cannot be fulfilled by a machine.

<u>Musicians:</u> The Catholic Funeral Mass uses the weekly Sunday mass as its model. There are common rituals, gestures, prayers, music, and moments of sacred silence that are observed. Because of this and other factors (including familiarity with audio system), it is our recommendation that you select a cantor and/or funeral choir and accompanist from the parish to lead music for the funeral mass. The pastor or parish staff can assist in making these contacts. If a family member or friend of the deceased is a practicing Catholic and has the experience of leading the assembly in song, they are welcome to lead music for the funeral mass.

Family members and friends who are not practicing Catholics are welcome to share their gift of music by singing a solo or as part of an ensemble, an appropriate and approved selection(s), before or during the funeral mass. They may also participate with a trained cantor and/or funeral choir, if desired.
